Rea of Hope is beginning our 9th year of helping women in early recovery from drugs and/or alcohol evolve into sober, productive and self-sufficient members of society. Thus far, we have celebrated 93 graduations from Rea of Hope; we are thrilled that our successful completions of our program are nearing the 100 mark.

Amy V. came to us full of skepticism but enough willingness to give recovery a try. Amy's demeanor was very flat when she first arrived and rarely smiled. Amy followed our suggestions and questioned many of them! She, like most of our residents, agreed with some of the guidelines but disagreed with the ones that interfered with her making her own choices. Amy slowly but surely began to work a great program with her sponsor, attended AA/NA meetings and followed suggestions given to her. Before we knew it, Amy was not only smiling....she was laughing and sharing her recovery with other residents. Amy is full of life today and is excited to see all the great things to come in her life of sobriety.

Jessica C. came to us with her head down and full of despair. She had a basic understanding of recovery but not real sure it would work for her. All she knew and had to know was that she needed help. Her life had already become so unmanageable that she felt as though there was very little hope for her. Jessica was very quiet and never caused a single problem so staff was a little concerned if she was truly working a program. We are selling the Guidebook which comes with extensive training and consultations for the new staff. A program in Wheeling was our first customer and we have enjoyed getting to share our message and to know their staff, as they have been spending a good bit of time in Charleston with us. We have served over 200 women; obviously many did not complete their stay, but I am sure that while at Rea of Hope, they know that there is truly hope and a better way of life. Graduating from our program requires a six month stay coupled with continuous sobriety, full time employment, working with the 12 stops of recovery with a sponsor and following our suggestions. This may seem like a short time to some people, but to those in recovery it is a very long and demanding journey. These ladies have to change not only their playmates, playgrounds, and play things; they also have to change their thinking process. Years of drug abuse and/or alchohol abuse has robbed us of self, family, friends, jobs and often our freedom. The good news is that there is a 'ray of hope' for those suffering from addiction and Rea of Hope is that place to get it! This quarter we once again are blessed to have 2 more graduates and both ladies are transitioning into our New Life Apartments.

baskets, sheets, vacuum cleaners, a wheel



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
