The horrors of loving an addict/alcoholic just go on and on. I have worked with addicts, alcoholics and their families for over 24 years and if I did not witness the miracles along the way, I would have thrown in the towel along time ago. I have learned to expect the unexpected; I have seen miracles too numerous to mention. YES, we can and do recover from what appears to be a hopeless life of self harming behaviors. Rea of Hope "expects a miracle" on every admission, we focus on the positives and work hard to eliminate the negatives. Due to the efforts of many, we have had 55 miracles graduate our program, this translates into a minimum of over 400 lives that are affected, (as estimated each resident directly affects a minimum of 8 people). Celebrate the season and enjoy the miracles along the way.
